3. To educate an engaged couple to understand the responsibility that a minister has to those who are married in the church.

Understanding the Minister's Role:

- 1. The minister has a responsibility under God for those whom he performs weddings. If a couple marries when not adequately prepared, then the minister shares in the couple's irresponsibility.
- 2. The minister is not paid by the church to perform weddings.
- 3. The minister does not have an obligation to marry everyone who comes to him to ask to be married.
- 4. After counseling with a couple, the minister has the right to refuse to marry anyone who feels he is not prepared for marriage.



Commitments for Pre-Marital Counseling:

- 1. We understand the purposes for pre-marital counseling and the minister's role in marriage preparation.
- 2. We agree to come for at least seven sessions of pre-marital counseling.
- 3. We agree to do the assignments as they are given each week,
- 4. We understand even after the seven sessions are completed that the minister has the right to refuse to marry us if he believes we are not adequately prepared for marriage.
